02.01.01	The Police reported by email the theft and recovery of a mobile phone at SWRA.	
02.01.02	Mr Close expressed his concern about the condition of the Jubilee chestnut tree but he accepted in the circumstances that it would be reasonable to remove it, although highly regrettable. He offered suggestions for a replacement and possible sources.	
02.02.00	ACCEPTANCE OF REASONS FOR ABSENCE Mr Cross was unable to attend. Mrs Stark was on holiday. Mrs Mills had been delayed by her husband's late arrival home.	
02.03.00	DECLARATIONS OF INTEREST nil	
02.04.00	MINUTES OF THE PREVIOUS MEETING	
	The Minutes of the previous meeting held on 11th January, copies of which had been circulated earlier to members, were approved.	Clerk
02.05.00	MATTERS ARISING FROM THE MINUTES	
02.05.02	Castle Hill. Advice from Lincolnshire Wildlife Trust and Historic England (HE) was still awaited on the most appropriate way forward on the care and planting of Castle Hill.	
02.05.02	Emergency Plan Due to pressure of other work, no further time had been possible on the emergency plan.	
02.05.03	<u>Drains</u> Not all drains had been properly cleared. JL had reminded the Llamyman manager of the need to maintain certain ditches. The danger from blockage of the culvert at the bottom of Hall Orchard Lane had been recognized but due to infill development there was no access for maintenance. Silting up was perceived as the major risk.	
02.05.04	Precept The precept demand had been duly submitted to NKDC.	
02.05.05	Handyman An attempt to contact the suggested handyman had been

02.05.06	Forge The purchase of the forge was nearing completion. NKDC	
	were continuing to offer support. They had been thanked for their	
	work on the building and the documentation for the transfer of	
	ownership.	
02.06.00	DISTRICT AND COUNTY MATTERS	
02.06.01	MO reported that she had had a meeting with senior representatives from BT and NKDC about better broadband coverage and had discovered that there was considerable demand for a good service even in a rural area. She advised that grants were available for improving the service. Interested parties should discuss their ideas and problems with the appropriate officer in NKDC.	
02.06.02	She mentioned that LCC faced a very serious shortfall in its budget so were keen on the idea of a unitary authority, mostly because it was perceived as a way of operating more efficiently and saving money.	
02.06.03	NKDC, however, had set up a number of small enterprises with the objective of making money so as to cover their own shortfalls and thus avoid cutting services.	
02.06.04	CM reported after the meeting by highlighting the new highways online defect reporting facilities. She drew attention to the community speed watch system which had been introduced in the summer of 2016 with promising results. She provided technical data and guidance on how to join the scheme. She also stated that the dog waste bin clearance charges were being discontinued.	
02.06.05	As a result of the example of the poorly sited skip in the High Street she had researched the permit scheme and produced a copy of the regulations. Unfortunately in 50 pages of regulations there was nothing about whom to contact about them to highlight any oversights.	
02.07.00	CLERK'S REPORT	
02.07.01	The clerk reminded members it is unlawful for any one councilor to seek to or purport to act on behalf of the council without specific authority. It followed that councilors could not make public statements about council policy until the matter had been decided in Council.	
02.07.02	Following the decision to refuse the mast offer, a parishioner had sought to offer another site and had asked the clerk for contact details but he had been refused so the offer had been relayed but was not taken up.	
02.07.03	The Ridges & Furrows (R&F) Project was still running. They wanted to have information boards in the village to engage walkers on their inter village walk but were not clear about what & where. Plaques had been suggested similar to the one on Sir William Robertson's cottage. Mr Goodhand had been invited to contribute ideas from his historical trail and had offered some ideas which might be included in due course.	Clerk
02.07.04	A builder's skip had been placed in The Green outside no 6. Because it was unlit and was behind a blind bend to speeding incoming traffic, the clerk had invited the police to deal with it. They had declined since it	

	
was considered a matter for highways. In fact, skip placing is a matter for highways: but having an unlit skip in the highway is an offence. The repeated disinclination of the police to act on obstruction of the highway had been referred to the PCC. The complaint had been acknowledged and was accompanied by an undertaking to have greater presence outside the primary school at peak times to inhibit thoughtless, obstructive parking. CM had had the skip properly lit by contacting the licensee. The licensing of the skip showed a clear lack of local knowledge since apparently no account had been taken of the farm traffic that uses the lane. The clerk noted how individuals had been contributing to the common good: Mr Cross by clearing the waste generated by the construction of the access steps to the embankment: Mr Lucas by having the gate post on Castle Hill replaced: Miss Sarah Brown by supporting the allotments and maintaining the pond outlet and Mr&Mrs Storer by litter picking.	
FINANCIAL REPORT The financial report showed spending of £1114 last month with £31,870 in reserves. Overall spending was within budget although Castle Hill was significantly overspent. The annual grass-cutting subsidy had not yet been paid. The whole of the s106 money (£10827) had been received.

02.13.00	TO AGREE A RESPONSE TO REPORTS THAT THE JUBILEE CHESTNUT IS SERIOUSLY ILL. This item was superseded by events in that the County Council had taken over responsibility for the tree. It was agreed in principle that, if it were felled, the tree should be replaced.	
02.14.00	TO RESPOND TO MR ROBINSON'S SUGGESTION ABOUT A GRILL TO PROTECT DUCKLINGS FROM DROWNING IN THE BECK OUTLET It was agreed that this was a good idea and that Mr Robinson should be invited to provide and fit one provided that he undertook to maintain it clear.	
02.15.00	TO CONSIDER A FORMAL COMPLAINT AGAINST THE CLERK. Council had examined the complaint and found the alleged actions unproven so decided there was no case to answer. The chairman would reply. It was further agreed that, in future, complaints should be made to the clerk in accordance with the published complaints policy.	JL
02.16.00	TO DISCUSS IDEAS FOR INFORMATION BOARDS WITHIN THE VILLAGE, See also 02.07.03. Planned photo montages in the Joiners Arms of historic scenes in the village were suggested to complement the tourist engagement scheme. The PCC's handbook in the church about the church was also mentioned as part of the scheme.	

02.17.00	TO BE UPDATED ON THE PLAY & LEISURE PROJECT. ML thought it more appropriate to brief the Village Hall committee first about her ideas for the Play & Leisure Project. but acknowledged that her biggest priority was raising enough money.	
02.18.00	TO AGREE HOW TO USE THE BALANCE OF THE S106 MONEY. It was noted that it had already been agreed to grant £5000 to the R&F project for signage (although how much of this was required was uncertain) and that money had been spent on building the access steps to the stepping out walk on top of the embankment and that these steps required a handrail. Previously it had been agreed to allocate £5000 to the Play & Leisure Project. Any balance from these tasks was conditionally bound to open space development under the original arrangement but the amount was unknown at this stage.	Clerk
